Stuart Allen Whitlock

October 7, 1945 – May 4, 2025 Stuart Allen Whitlock, beloved husband, dad, granddad, and friend, passed away peacefully in his sleep on May 4, 2025, at the age of 79, at Bailey's Hospice Center in St. Augustine, Florida.



Born on October 7, 1945, in Council Grove, Kansas, Stuart grew up with a strong work ethic and an enduring sense of self-reliance. He loved to tell the story of how his mom would take him out to the garden with a promise that he would walk back, only to carry him when he refused to walk.

A proud graduate of Council Grove High School (Class of 1963), Stuart was a dedicated athlete who played basketball, football, and ran track. He pursued a degree in chemistry at Emporia State University and later earned a master's degree from Kansas State University. After being drafted into the U.S. Army, Stuart served with honor in Washington, D.C., working with the horses of the Old Guard Caisson Detachment, forming lifelong friendships in the

Though they had known each other as children, Stuart reconnected with Lynda Mae Colby while at Kansas State University. Their relationship grew into a deep and lasting love, and they were married on May 10, 1970. Stuart's professional life was devoted to environmental science. He worked as a chemist at ESE in Gainesville, Florida, and later became co-owner of Martel Laboratories in Baltimore, Maryland. After retiring, he and Lynda embraced a life of global travel, family, and sunshine, settling into their beachside paradise in St. Augustine.

Stuart will be remembered for his boundless enthusiasm, generous spirit, and unwavering devotion to those he loved. He loved to share stories, whether to a stranger or a lifelong friend, and had a way of effortless chatter that could light up any room. He had a knack for making everyone feel taken care of, and his favorite expression, "It doesn't get any better than this", perfectly captured his appreciation for life's simple joys.

He is preceded in death by his parents, Boyd and Bertha Whitlock; siblings Louise Pattison, Gilbert Whitlock and Helen Becerra; and parents-in-law, Gene and Peggy Colby. He is survived by his loving wife of 55 years, Lynda; daughter Angela Hulays and husband David; son Brian Whitlock and wife Jennifer; and five grandchildren: Owen and Max Hulays, and Colby, Emma, and Charlotte Whitlock.

Larry lived his early years in rural Peabody then moved to Livermore, CA with his parents and siblings. When he turned 15, he proudly rode the train alone back to Kansas to help his grandfather farm every summer. He graduated from Livermore High School and from there enlisted in the United States Air Force where he proudly served in Vietnam and Guam.

He married Susan Yung on his return and to this union Krissy and Becky were born. Eventually Larry moved back to Kansas with his family of four to run the Larsen farm. Larry and Susan later divorced.

In 1992, Larry married the love of his life, Karen Davis in Council Grove, KS. During this time Lucas, Kiefer, Brianna and Xavier arrived one-by-one to make him a proud daddy again. All of his children were his pride and joy. That joy and pride grew a little more every time a grandchild was born.

Larry found his true calling in life when he discovered EMS. Larry has served in Sedgwick County and Marion County as a paramedic. Small town guy loves big cities

Growing up in a family, you sometimes think all your brothers and sisters are going to feel the same way you do about things. It can sometimes be a shock to realize that they don't, but most of the time it doesn't

I have never understood Chuck's love for the city. Even as a kid, Chuck was fascinated with big cities. That definitely is not me! Oh, I might want to visit a big city, but live there? Nope.

He says he always liked cities like Manhattan and Topeka as a kid. He, like his big sisters, attended KSU. He amped that a bit when he decided to go to college in Chicago. He attended Moody Bible Institute there, graduating in 1984. The school was near one of the most famous housing projects there -- Cabrini Green. (On a side note, the opening scene to the old show, Good Times, was filmed at Cabrini Green.) When my brother was in school, that place was full of drugs, crime and gangs. 
