Phase One of the project is planned for completion ahead of the Santa Fe Trail Symposium, which is a ten-day celebration in September that is expected to bring 300 guests to town.

Such a large race can be dangerous for both riders and law enforcement. A pursuit near the start of Unbound Gravel activity early Saturday led to injuries for a Lyon County deputy and two arrests. Sheriff Jeff Cope said a pickup ignored traffic control north of Emporia and fled deputies across rural roads. After deputies tried to block the vehicle along K-99, Deputy Doug Stump's cruiser was struck and rolled into a ditch. He was treated and released from Newman Regional Health. The truck was later located in Emporia, where officers arrested Kaitlynn Mundell, 32, and Preston Ashburn, 42, both of Emporia. Charges include aggravated battery on law enforcement, possession of a controlled substance, obstruction, and traffic violations. Formal charges are pending.

14 million bees escape overturned semi

Washington State was abuzz Friday after approximately 14 million honeybees escaped an overturned semi-truck. The truck, carrying 70,000 pounds of hives and bees was driving near the Canadian border when it rolled into a ditch after a tight turn; the driver was uninjured. Over two dozen local beekeepers swarmed to help recover the pollinating honey bees.
