Museum's Flea Market Festival draws large crowd

Finney Historical Society and Museum Flea Market Festival was well attended Saturday.

The rain the night before and during the morning of, didn't deter attendees.

Steve Quakenbush, Executive Director of the Museum, said they counted 4,106 attendees for the 2025 festival.

"We were in the range of 3,200 to 3,700 in the last two years, so this is an increase," he

County approves medication locking units for EMS

The purchase of medicine locking and tracking equipment for the Finney County EMS was approved by the Finney County Commission at its regular meeting on July

Kenny Smith, EMS Director, said the reason for the purchase is because he noticed a lack of consistent tracking and locking mechanisms for controlled medication after he became EMS director in

EMS currently has two Smith said they will not only

different types of systems, have the locking mechaboth of which are not tracking, Smith said. They are also unable to track due to missing software.

"All medications that we have are controlled by licenses through the Kansas Board of Pharmacy. Controlled substances are further controlled by our DEA license," he said. "Per DEA regulations, there are to be control measures in place to aid in making sure that controlled medications are not accessible by the public."

With the new locking units,

nisms in place, which they already have, but be able to track the boxes separately and know who and when someone accesses them.

There will be eight units in total, one in each EMS station and one in each ambulance, and a cloud-based tracking system, Smith said.

The system is by Knox and costs \$19,560.

The commission also approved a lease agreement between the county and Garden City for the use of Fire Station 3.

Smith said that as part of

the development of Fire Station 3, a designated portion of the facility was designed to accommodate Finney County EMS.

"This collaborative use of space supports the joint mission of providing timely and effective emergency response services to the community," he said. "The lease agreement outlines the terms of this agreement."
