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with measles. anyone Before the first measles vaccine was made available in 1963, this single virus was responsible for over 2.5 million deaths around the world each year. In the United States, there were 3-4 million cases of measles each year, resulting in 400 to 500 deaths. Most of these deaths were in children less than five years old or the elderly. Deaths are usually caused by pneumonia (infection of the lungs) or infection of the brain (encephalitis).

It takes 95% of the population to be vaccinated against measles to avoid



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an outbreak. When vaccinating yourself or your child, you are caring for your family and helping to care for our community. We are currently seeing months of age and the outbreaks because of the lack of vaccination. Indeed, most children who get measles will even-

tually recover. Still, the fact that two children have already died in this outbreak underscores the fact that this is a serious illness and that measles vaccination needs to be taken seriously.

Measles is the most contagious infectious disease or virus that is known. It is spread through respiratory secretions and can remain on surfaces for up to two hours after an infected person has left the room. If you put 100 people in a room who are not immune to measles and one person with measles enters that room, at least 90% of those in the room are going to get infected with measles. In unvaccinated populations, a person with measles will infect 12 to 18 susceptible contacts, while a person with COVID will only infect one to two susceptible others. This means measles is about 10 times more infectious than

Measles vaccination is highly effective. After a single dose, 93% of mea-

sles infections are prevented, and after two doses, 97% are prevented. We generally give the first dose between 12 and 15 second between four and six years old. However, in areas where there is currently an outbreak or if you are in surrounding counties or traveling to an area of the world where measles is prevalent, I would recommend talking to your provider to see if vaccination earlier is appropriate as the second dose of measles vaccina-

tion can be given 28 days following the first.

The first symptoms of measles start one to two weeks after exposure to the infection and include fever, runny nose, cough, and red eyes. This is followed by a red rash that usually starts on the face and rapidly spreads over the entire body. Fever increases as the rash spreads. Complications of the illness, including ear infections, pneumonia, and brain infections, occur around one to two weeks into the illness.
