As we wrapped things up for Valley Falls council. an early deadline last Friday, 16 additional people had filed for public office in Jefferson

Races for mayor, council in Nortonville

County. However, there are still 10 school board seats open among the six districts and eight council seats not spoken for among the eight cities.

Nortonville is the only city with races at this point with only a short time left to file. The filing deadline is noon Monday, June 2.

Dustin Roloff, 42, Nortonville, filed for mayor the afternoon of May 19 creating a race for that office. Incumbent mayor Raymond Brown filed for reelection April 28.

Nortonville voters will also see a contest for the two council seats up for election. Those who have filed are Jacob Abel, Jack Weishaar, Robert E. Hauk, Steven L. Noll, and Mitchell Ellerman. Neither incumbent council member, Steve Belveal or Lora Weishaar, has filed at this time.

City council slates remain unfilled in McLouth, Meriden, Ozawkie, Oskaloosa, and Winchester.

Incumbent mayors in Ozawkie and Valley Falls have filed for re-election and are still unopposed.

As of Friday all school districts had school board seats going begging from three candidates needed in Perry-Lecompton and two each in Valley Falls and Oskaloosa. Jefferson County North, Jefferson West, and McLouth each have one board position that no one has filed for. No contest in any district has developed.

In the improvement districts, only Lakewood Hills has three candidates for that board's twoyear terms. Only one each has filed in Lakeside Village and Lakeshore Estates.

The two incumbent representatives to the Meadlowlark Extension board have filed for re-election but there are a number of openings for the drainage district boards.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OSKALOOSA, KAN-

SECTION 1. Section 15-523 of the Code of the City of Oskaloosa is hereby amended to read as follows:

SAME; FEE SCHEDULE. The fee for each residential unit of City solid waste collection service shall be \$15.00 per month, which includes the use of one poly cart. There is an additional charge of \$1.07 per household for the use of the city-wide recycling receptacles.

ADDITIONAL RATES; SER-

1. Two (2) poly cart containers shall be provided to the City Hall at no cost.

2. A forty (40) yard dumpster shall be provided to the City free of charge for Old Settler's Reunion festival.

3. A \$5.00 per month, per barrel charge for barrels around downtown square.

4. A \$50.00 per month charge for a three (3) yard dumpster at the City Shop.

5. A \$50.00 per month charge for a three (3) yard dumpster at the City Pool.

6. Four (4) forty (40) yard dumpsters shall be provided for spring Cleanup at a rate of \$165 per dumpster plus current yearly tonnage.

SECTION 2. The City Council has imposed this increased fee schedule to be assessed on billings from February 1, 2025 until this Ordinance is repealed or amended.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effective and be in full force from and after its passage, approval and publication as

Plea agreement reached with Murray-Crawshaw

A plea agreement was reached in state vs. Benz Rey Keyshawn Murray-Crawford in Jefferson County District Court May 8 with sentencing set for 11 a.m. June 12.

The case involved multiple charges stemming back to April 2023 when the defendant was first charged with domestic battery and had an Ozawkie address.


A second complaint with four counts was filed in June 2024 charging Murray-Crawford with criminal threat, criminal restraint, endangering a child, and deprivation of property, i.e. a vehicle.

A third arrest and complaint followed in December 2024 when he was charged with fleeing or attempting to elude a police officer and possession of a controlled substance. The defendant has a Kansas City, Mo., address listed on that complaint.

The court accepted his "no contest" pleas in the first and second cases of endangering a child and criminal threat.

The court dismissed counts 2 and 4 of criminal restraint and deprivation of property and it dismissed the charges in the third complaint, fleeing a police officer and possessing a controlled substance.

Judge Christopher Etzel ordered a pre-sentence investigation and was asked by the defense to change the defendant's "no contact" restrictions with the victim or victims to be modified to state "no violent contact." The judge said he would consider it.
