More than 100 new laws on the Kansas books

Kansas lawmakers passed 129 bills that became law in the state with 101 taking effect July

The new Kansas laws are a mixture of bipartisan legislation and some that Gov. Laura Kelly initially vetoed before Republican legislators overrode her vetoes. Some of the highlights are child care, firearms, and traffic.

House Bill 2045 aims to reduce the child care shortage in Kansas by consolidating more than 20 state child care programs into the Kansas Office of Early Childhood. The bill also allows fewer education requirements for some workers in a childcare facility.

Another new law focuses on child support payments. Under House Bill 2062, pregnant women can seek child support at conception. The bill also recognizes unborn children as dependents, qualifying parents for a more than \$2,000 income tax exemption.

Senate Bill 137 allows Kansas law enforcement agencies to sell or transfer forfeited firearms

to a licensed firearms dealer. Forfeited firearms are guns that law enforcement seizes because they believed the guns were involved in criminal activity.

A new traffic law is an expansion to the state's slow down, move over law, which previously covered emergency, tow, utility, and maintenance vehicles. The new law requires drivers to move over a lane, or, if moving over isn't possible, slow down when passing a stopped or disabled car with hazards or warning signals.

The Kansas Department of Transportation reported that almost 1,000 empty vehicles were stuck on the side of a road from 2018 to 2023. Failure to move over or slow down could result in a \$75 fine.

Other notable new laws include:

 $\bullet A law bans gender-affirming$ care for minors, which includes puberty-suppressing drugs, cross-sex hormones and gender reassignment surgery.

• Kansas doubled the amount individuals and organizations can donate to political candidates, and removed the cap on contributions from partisan committees to candidates. People can now donate \$4,000 to people seeking a statewide office, \$2,000 to state senate candidates and \$1,000 for campaigns for the house and local offices.

 Tax laws were modified, including a gradual shift to a flat income tax

•Senate Bill 4 eliminated the state's three-day grace period for mailed ballots. Kansas would previously accept mailed ballots within three days of Election Day, provided it was postmarked on or before Election Day.

•The date communities can hold special elections was narrowed, and now must be on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March, or the same day as the primary or general election.

•House Bill 2016 makes an obituary notice from a funeral grounds to remove someone from the voter rolls and allows military spouses to work as poll workers.

• House Bill 2382 requires Kansas schools to show a presentation on fetal development any time there's instruction regarding human growth, development or sexuality.

 Property owners will receive some tax relief with Senate Bill 35, which eliminates 1.5 mills of state property tax used to fund government buildings. That funding is now supposed to come from other revenue.

•Intended as an economic development incentive, Senate Bill 98 gives a sales tax exemption to data centers.

• Redevelopers of historic buildings will get enhanced tax credits from Senate Bill 227.

•HB 2231 is a bundle that includes tying income thresholds to inflation for a tax freeze program under the Homestead Property Tax Refund Act; and Exempt ATVs, UTVs, dirt bikes, golf carts, motorized bikes, ebikes, electric scooters, trailers weighing less than 15,000 pounds, any watercraft and any watercraft trailer from personal property taxes.

•Senate Bill 9 restricts foreign land ownership around military bases. The law also prohibits buying drones whose critical components were made in a country of concern.

AN ORDINANCE IN CITY OF WINCHESTER, KAN-SAS, AMENDING CITY OF WINCHESTER CODE TO IN-CLUDE CHAPTER 11, AR-TICLE 2, § 11-202, A LOUD NOISE ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS, under the Kansas Constitution Article 12, § 5 and K.S.A. 12-101, the City of Winchester has powers to determine its local affairs and governance by ordinance; and WHEREAS, the Governing Body of Winchester, Kansas has authority to adopt ordinances to provide for the health, welfare, and enjoyment of citizens and persons present within its city limits; and

WHEREAS, the Code of the City of Winchester, Kansas includes nuisance ordinances and has adopted the Uniform Public Offense Code for Kansas: and WHEREAS, the Code of the City of Winchester, Kansas does not provide for a specific noise ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of Winchester, Kansas has determined a need for regulation of loud noises within the city limits.

THEREFORE, BE IT OR-DAINED BY THE GOVERN-ING BODY OF THE CITY OF WINCHESTER, KANSAS: the Code of the City of Winchester, Kansas Chapter 11, Article 2, §11-202 shall regulate loud noises within the city limits as

"11-202. Loud noise prohib-

The following shall be unlawful: All noises or noise producing activities that are repetitive, excessive, unreasonable, or unusually loud and that would disturb, offend, or annoy a person of ordinary sensitivity, including, but not limited to:

(a) Unreasonable noises during quiet hours, including:

(1) Any sound resulting from the erecting, constructing, excavating, demolishing, altering, or repairing of any structure, as to cause a sound plainly audible to neighboring inhabitants of a reasonable and ordinary sensitivity between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.;

(2) The repairing, rebuilding, or modifying of any motor vehicle, motorcycle, or motorboat in such a manner as to cause a sound plainly audible to neighboring inhabitants of a reasonable and ordinary sensitivity between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.;

(3) The operating of any power tool, garden tool, lawn- /s/ Whitney Bryant

mower, snow blower, or other similar equipment or device in residential areas in such a manner as to cause a sound plainly audible to neighboring inhabitants of reasonable and ordinary sensitivity between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.;

(4) The operating, playing, permitting, or causing to be operated or played any sound amplification or producing device or similar equipment in a manner as to cause a sound plainly audible to neighboring inhabitants of a reasonable and ordinary sensitivity between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00

(5) The creation of noise in connection with loading or unloading any vehicle in the ing and destruction of bales, boxes, crates, and containers, in residential areas in such a manner as to cause a sound plainly audible to neighboring inhabitants of reasonable and ordinary sensitivity between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.

(6) Repetitive, loud animal noises, including persistent and unabated dog barking; and

(7) Repetitive, sustained, or continuous noises produced at a sufficient volume as to disturb the peace or repose of neighboring inhabitants of reasonable and ordinary sensitivity.

(b) Exemptions. The prohibitions set forth in subsection (a) shall not apply to:

(1) Emergency work necessary to restore property to a safe condition or to protect a person and property from imminent danger;

(2) Emergency vehicles; (3) Alarm systems;

(4) Trash and waste removal operations:

(5) Aircraft or railroad activi-(6) Church bells and campa-

nile chimes; and (7) Noises as a part of, or in consequence to, the exercise of constitutionally protected rights including speech, assembly, association, protest, or

religion. (c) Penalty. Should any person fail to comply with the ordinances within this section they shall be punished in accordance with § 1-117."
