was convicted of distribution of fentanyl and was sentenced to 41 months in the (KDOC).

Upon release from the KDOC, both will be placed on post release supervision and be required to Register pursuant to the Kansas Offender Registration

Act. The defendants were found responsible for their roles in distributing fentanyl to Campiti, who was found unresponsive in his home in Frontenac on April 21, 2023. He died as a result of a fentanyl overdose. The Frontenac Police Department responded to the scene and began the initial investigation. The investigation determined that the sale of the fentanyl occurred in the City of Pittsburg. Detectives of the Pittsburg Police Department then took the lead in the case.

The Crawford County Sheriff's Depart-

ment, The KBI and Homeland Security Investigation also assisted. The investigation was extensive and took almost a year to complete.
