125 YEARS

Thursday, November 15, 1900

THE LEADER. The Department Store of J. H. Tracey now occupies two commodious rooms, which increase in floor space was made necessary by his fast increasing business. Tracey's store has expanded more in the time he has been in Sabetha than any other business house in town, due to the fact that he has sold a good quality of goods at a much lower price than could be found elsewhere. The addition of another room to his store gives a chance to better display his large stock and at the same time wait upon his crowds of customers with more convenience. Tracey's Racket is the leader — others follow, but never catch up.

A Narrow Escape. Bert Horton met with a serious accident Monday. While working in the gravel pit for Jacob Bernet the bank caved in on him. He saw the impending danger and got part of the way out, but the mass of earth and gravel caught him and threw him face downward with his head toward the opening. His face rested partly on one arm, making a few inches of space for breathing. His head was covered about a foot deep. His companion, who was some distance away at the time of the accident, could hear his cries faintly and was thus enabled to locate him precisely. He soon had Bert's head uncovered, and then dug him out and brought him to town. He is severely bruised and sore as a boil all over, but no bones were broken, and we hope he will soon be as good as new. It was a narrow escape from a horrible death.

100 YEARS

Wednesday, November 18, 1925

New Cream Station Here. A new cream station will be established in Sabetha soon by the Hanford Produce company, of Sioux City, Ia., one of the most extensive and reliable such firms in the country. The station will be located in the building just north of the Post Office and will be operated by R. W. Moorhead. It will be put in operation as soon as the equipment arrives probably some time this week.

The Riely Bus which left Seneca Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 did not reach Holton until 9:30 that night taking six hours to make the trip which is usually made in two hours and twenty minutes. The roads were at their worst Tuesday and Wednesday.

75 YEARS

Wednesday, November 15, 1950

A contract for grading and culverts on the new Bern road, highway 71 has been approved by the state highway commission. James Coffey of Topeka got the contract for \$50,816. The Nemaha river bridge on the same road went to Inland Construction Co. of Wichita for \$79,938. Other road work south of Corning and on the Goff-Oneida and Wood-lawn secondary roads for which bids were to have been opened at the same time were not mentioned in a list in the Kansas City Times, but contract may also have been approved for these.

The city of Sabetha this week let contracts to two firms for the construction of a modern new sewage disposal plant south of town. The Prestressed Concrete Corporation of Kansas City was awarded the contract to build the disposal plant while the Walters Sand Company of Manhattan will build the sewer lines, manholes, lines leading to the disposal plant, etc.

Wednesday, November 12, 1975

Kurt M Saylor, Cashier at Morrill State Bank, Morrill, Ks., has just returned from the Nebraska Center for Continuing Education, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, where he attended and completed the Intermediate School of Banking, held October 27-31, 1975. The Intermediate School of Banking is sponsored by the banking associations of Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska in cooperation with the College of Business Administration, University of Nebraska. The School is designed to cover the overall concepts and practical aspects of bank management.

RECEIVES DEGREE IN BUSINESS. Baumholder, Germany (AHTNC)-Army First Lieutenant James L. Isch, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer S. Isch, Morrill, Ks., received his Masters of Science degree in Business Administration from Boston (Mass.) University Oct. 15 while serving as chief, military pay section with the 17th Finance Section, Baumholder, Germany. A 1968 graduate of Morrill High School, he attended Kansas State University, Manhattan, and received a B.S. degree in 1972.

25 YEARS

Wednesday, November 15, 2000

Hillcrest Apartments Manager Carolyn Heiniger says the apartment complex is now open for business and taking applications from people who would like to live there. The first two apartment buildings will be inhabitable by the middle of December. These buildings house eight units. Every apartment has a garage. Hillcrest Apartments are located at 515 Roosevelt St.

10 YEARS

Wednesday, November 18, 2015

At its 2015 Annual convention in Wichita on Wednesday, Nov. 4, the Kansas Association of Counties awarded Brown County Sheriff John Merchant with its prestigious "County Official of the Year award." The Kansas Association of Counties "County Official of the Year" is given annually to individuals who have contributed to the betterment of county government in a manner above and beyond what is expected in their everyday duties. It is not a longevity award, but recognition of significant contributions to their county government and county government in Kansas generally. In addition to the award the winner will have the opportunity to award a \$1,000 scholarship to a deserving student of their choosing from their county.

A Sabetha building was demolished Monday, Nov. 9. The building at 1328 Oregon Street had, since 2009, been the site of "My Friends House, a recovery house for men who had been released from prison. Previously, the building was a photography studio and the Catholic Church.
