County Commissioners Voice Support for Nudity Ordinance

A pair of Kingman County commissioners voiced support for local municipalities adopting ordinances that would make it easier for law enforcement officials and the county attorney to take action against public nudity following the approval of an ordinance restricting public nudity in Cowley County last

Kingman resident Dale Envart spoke to the commissioners during the public ers said he would "almost go as far as comment portion of the meeting Monday. Enyart said he had sent each of the commissioners information regarding an ordinance passed by the Cowley County commissioners.

Cowley County commissioners approved and ordinance that could punish offenders with a fine of \$500 and up to 30 days in jail, according to a story by the Cowley Post. Cowley County's ordinance states "It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly or intentionally appear in a state of nudity in a public place or on private property (outside of the home) where visible to others."

The Cowley County commissioners took action after numerous complaints were made regarding an Arkansas City man "going on nude walks," within the community.

The board of commissioners did make exceptions for children under 10 and mothers who breastfeed their chil-

Kingman County and Kingman city commissioners received complaints last year when an unidentified woman was seen dancing at the city's splash pad. While the woman was clothed witnesses said her clothing became transparent when she started dancing in the water, which exposed her body to those

"And I don't think we've ever seen them (the results), and being as we have a vested stake in them, I think we ought to try and get that information so we can be studying a little before it goes any further. That would be my recommendation anyway."

Kingman City Commissioner Jon Wollen, who attended a portion of Monday's county meeting, said he was not aware of the study but would look into the matter.

The Kingman Leader-Courier reported on the study in October 2023. The Wichita State assessment team did make some recommendations regarding the Kingman Fire Department, which included hiring a full-time fire chief, which the city has done. The study also recommended having a number of firefighters "on call," as well as those on-call firefighters getting paid to respond.

Another recommendation included modate a 24-hour staffing capability, which the Kingman EMS department established when it moved the EMS station to the current location on Highway 54.

The assessment team also recommended the KFD look at engine replacements due to the age of the current fleet. The report said the average age of the engines was 29 years old in 2023 and the National Fire Protection Association recommends departments "seriously consider the value or risk"
